Call to Confession

There's a moment in our scripture today when Jesus turns to Peter, named "the rock" of the church, and says, "Get behind me, Satan!" I don't know about you all, but that's a pretty bad day for Peter. It's a pretty bad day when Jesus calls you Satan! Fortunately, this absurd moment comforts me with the knowledge that even Peter made mistakes. Peter, who was given the keys to Heaven. 

March 17th, 2024 <u>Wandering Heart:</u> "Teach Me" Focal Scriptures: Matthew 18: 15-22, Psalm 119: 9-16

<u>Theme Connections:</u> Peter is often all or nothing—either resisting Jesus or drawing closer to him in earnest. In this scripture, we see a version of Peter who is hungry to learn. His posture is humble and open—he wants to



absorb Jesus' teachings like a wet sponge. He asks a question and might expect a straightforward answer: "How many times should I forgive?" Instead, Jesus' math is not predictable—it's infinite. Forgiveness is abundant; grace is not earned. In your own faith, do you find comfort in theological formulas? Do you wish for straightforward answers? Can you let go of black-and-white thinking and instead embrace the infinite colors of grace?

Each chapter helps readers to connect an image drawn from a psalm, such as paths, faces, blessing, tables, waiting, thanksgiving, listening, being alone or abandoned, and hands, with their own lives. Nominations for Consistory Election

In May, at our annual congregational meeting, Church on the Hill will elect **one (1) new Elder** and **one (1) new Deacon** to the consistory. At this time, the congregation has the opportunity to nominate members of the congregation to serve in this office. Members of the congregation are able to nominate themselves.

When discerning whom you might nominate to serve in this office, please keep in mind the following:

- 1) Elders are women and men set apart for a ministry of care and oversight of all the ministries and members of the congregation. The elders are called to provide spiritual care to the members of the church and to the minister. They are to be people of spiritual commitment, desiring to love and serve both God and neighbor in the church and in the world.
- 2) Deacons are women and men set apart for a ministry of mercy, service, and outreach. Deacons are called to oversee the benevolences of the church and to care for those in material need. They are to be people of spiritual commitment and compassionate spirit, desiring to love and serve both God and neighbor in the church and in the world.
- 3) Nominations and elections are not a popularity contest in the church. Rather, we should prayerfully consider the character, wisdom, spiritual gifts, and talents of individuals that will contribute to the leadership of the congregation and the overall mission of the church.
