The Seven Last Words of Christ

Théodore Dubois (1837-1924)

Introduction

All ye people traveling on life's highway, hearken to me, look upon me, is there sorrow like unto my sorrow? For the Lord Omnipotent the Almighty hath dealt bitterly with me and my people; call me nevermore Naomi, evermore call me Mara.

The First Word

Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do. Then cried out the people: "He of death is guilty, take Him, take Him, let us crucify Him; let His blood be on us and on our children." Then crucified they Jesus and the two thieves, one on His right hand and the other one on His left hand.

The Second Word

Verily, thou today, shalt be with me in paradise. Amen, so I tell thee. O Lord, remember me, when Thou comest into Thy kingdom.

The Third Word

Woman, behold thy son. See the holy mother sighing, watches as her son is dying, bleeding on the cruel cross. Ah! Who could see her without weeping, as she kneeleth vigil keeping, bowed by her grief and fearful loss?

The Fourth Word

O my Father, why hast Thou forsaken me? All those who were my friends have now forsaken me, and they that hate me have risen up against me, and they have all betrayed me whom I have loved. Even the vine that once I planted and that oft I tended: why has all thy sweetness more and more turned to bitterness, that thou dost crucify me?

The Fifth Word

I thirst! And the Jews then passing by Him, railed on Him and mocked Him, both wagging their heads at Him, and crying to Him: Ah! Thou that wouldst destroy the temple, if Thou be Jesus, Son of the Father, now from the cross descend Thou, that we may see Thee and believe Thee, when we behold it. If Thou art King over Israel save Thyself now.

The Sixth Word

Father, into Thy keeping I commend my soul. For Thou art my Father and my God, Thou art my Saviour in time of trouble. For Thou art my shield and buckler, my Saviour in time of trouble, my Saviour, my strong salvation.

The Seventh Word

Once more spake Jesus, crying with a loud voice: "It is finished!" And Jesus bowed down His head and yielded up the ghost. And about the sixth hour there was darkness, obscuring the sun's light, and darkness covered the earth until about the ninth hour; and the veil of the temple was rent, and the trembling earth did quake, rocks were rending, graves were opening and saints arose.

About the Music

The lyrics to "Cross Cry" are based on an American Spiritual. The music is by Gilbert M. Martin (1941-), an American composer with hundreds of works to his credit. Cross Cry is noted for its "dramatic" impact. Certainly, some of the power of the work comes from its first-person construction – "I think I heard him [Jesus] say..." – putting us all there with Jesus in his Good Friday Passion. Then the lyrics change and Jesus speaks, "Then I'll die easy..." This back-and-forth between the crowd and Jesus continues until the women sing, "I think I heard him say when he was givin' up the ghost..." In his final plea, Jesus asks his disciples to, "...please take my mother home."

On Good Friday we offer the sacred cantata "The Seven Last Words of Christ" by the French composer Theodore Dubois (1837-1924). The "words" are not really individual words but rather brief sayings. For the Cantata, Dubois incorporates as an Introduction, O Vos Ommes (All ye people) a text taken from Lamentations 1:12, so there are eight movements in the work. In addition to the sayings, Dubois adds Bible text to offer more of the story of Jesus's passion.

The following is the traditional order of the words with the scriptural reference. We use here the King James translation since it is the Bible text Dubois would have used.

- 1. Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do. Luke 23:34 (Forgiveness)
- 2. Verily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in paradise. Luke 23:43 (Salvation)
- 3. Woman, behold thy son! and Behold thy Mother. John 19:26-27 (Relationship)
- 4. My God, my God, why has thou forsaken me? Mathew 27:46 and Mark 15:34 (Abandonment)
- 5. I thirst. John 19:28 (Distress)
- 6. It is finished. John 19:30 (Triumph)
- 7. Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit. Luke 23:46 (Reunion)

There is no single account that includes all the sayings. A great deal of Biblical scholarship discusses the reasons for the different versions of the Crucifixion, but exploring those reasons is beyond the scope of this note.
